

What is RECA?

RECA is a federal program, administered by the Department of Justice, that provides compensation to those harmed by radioactive waste during the WWII and Cold War eras

- ☐ First instituted in 1990
- ☐ Expanded to Missouri in 2025

Who qualifies?

You are eligible to apply if you or your loved one...

- ...lived, attended school, or worked in an impacted zip code for 2+ years prior to diagnosis, and;
- ...contracted one of twenty-one diseases linked to radiation exposure.

- ☐ Any leukemia (provided initial exposure occurred after age 20)
- ☐ Lymphoma (other than Hodgkin's disease)
- Multiple myeloma

- 1) Print and complete the Manhattan Project Waste Claim form;
- 2) Gather required documentation: proof of identity/relationship, proof of residency, and proof of diagnosis;
- 3) Make a copy of the entire application for your records;
- 4) Mail to the Department of Justice:

5) Track your claim number: this is assigned by the Department of Justice at the beginning of processing.

How do I apply?

Proof of Identity

If you are applying...

...on behalf of yourself:

- Certified copy or original birth certificate;
- Certified copy or original marriage license(s) to document all name changes (if applicable);
- Certified copy or original divorce decree(s) for previous marriage(s) to document name change (if applicable).

...as a surviving beneficiary (spouse):

- ☐ Self-applicant documents;
- Certified copy or original death certificate of spouse;
- Certified copy or original birth certificate (yours);
- Certified copy or original marriage license(s) (yours) to document all name changes;
- Certified copy or original divorce decree(s) or death certificate(s) to document previous marriages (if applicable).

...as a surviving beneficiary (child):

- Self-applicant documents;
- ☐ Certified copy or original death certificates of parents and all other spouses;
- Certified copy or original birth certificate or adoption papers (yours + all siblings);
- Certified copy or original marriage license(s) (yours + all siblings) to document all name changes;
- Certified copy or original divorce decree(s) (yours + all siblings) to document all name changes (if applicable);
- Certified copy or original death certificate of any deceased siblings (if applicable):
- ☐ Signatures of all surviving siblings.

Proof of residency

Keep in mind:

- ✓ School, work, OR residency;
- ✓ TWO years prior to diagnosis;
- ✓ Only ONE zip code required (multiple possible);
- ✓ Originals or copies certified by the issuing institution.

Examples of acceptable documentation: Tax records School records Employment records Birth and marriage records Personal letters or envelopes ☐ Church/religious records Voting records Census records Personal diaries

Proof of Diagnosis

Keep in mind:

- ✓ Records must be verified by record holding institution with a signed and dated letter on official letterhead, specifying type and number of medical record attached;
- ✓ Specific examples of medical records accepted for each cancer are listed at the end of the claim form;
- ✓ Death certificates must indicate the cancer diagnosis and be signed by an attending physician to serve as medical records;
- ✓ The Missouri Cancer Registry does not provide records but will speak
 with the Department of Justice on your behalf with your permission (see
 pages 10 and 14).

Examples of records: pathology reports, autopsy reports, radiology studies or examinations, and summary medical reports (such as discharge or operative reports)

Missouri Bureau of Vital Records (DHSS): birth and death certificates

City and County Recorder of Deeds and Circuit Courts: birth, death, and marriage certificates, divorce decrees, personal property tax receipts

IRS: tax history, employment records

Social Security Administration: deceased individual's SSN

US Census Bureau: census records 1960-present

Missouri State Archives: residency records, long form death certificates (prior to 1974)

Public and private school districts: school records

Hospital and primary care physicians' offices: medical records

County libraries: printing services and residency records
